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





REFERENCE IMAGE



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We will now render the basic portrait we drew in the first lesson with the focus being on building up the values of the face in layers.



STEP 1:

With your lightest pencil, lay an even value of shading throughout most of the face, only avoiding the brightest highlights.



STEP 2:

With a darker pencil, add dimension to your first layer of shading by adding more pencil strokes on the darker parts of those shadows. Start to darken the details of the eyes after.



STEP 3:

Using the same pencil, add an even laydown of value to the hair. Make sure it's darker than the face so it separates itself into its own section.



STEP 4:

Using your darkest pencil, add definition to the sketch by cleaning up the lines and finalizing the details of the hair.
